

**LONG-TERM RESIDENCE AND CITIZENSHIP
IN CONTEMPORARY BRITAIN**

This one-day conference will explore the changing relationship between migration, long-term residence, and citizenship in the United Kingdom. Long term residence and citizenship are each becoming harder to obtain, and more critical to an individual's status in Britain. Bringing together speakers from law and other disciplines, this conference will address the implications of this more restrictive approach. Are these developments a significant departure in official thinking about residence and citizenship? Can they be justified in terms of integration and social cohesion? What are the implications for equality and human rights for migrants? What should policy on long-term residence and naturalisation look like?

The conference will be of interest to academics and postgraduate students from all disciplines concerned with migration, and to lawyers and NGO staff with an interest in migration.
